

## ATTENDANCE IS CRITICAL AT THE END OF THE SCHOOL YEAR!

Every day matters. That means that each school day contains something of value. It was true on the first day of school and it's true now, as classes wind down.

It is critical that your child be in school this time of year. Many events that occur at the end of the school year will play a significant role in how well your child does this year. Your child's passing or failure may even be at stake.

Here are just a few of the reasons your child must be in school:

- **Review work.** At this time of year, teachers devote class time to reviewing the entire school year. This is to prepare students for testing that covers the whole year. Often students prepare for two tests per class. They must prepare for state exams. Then they must prepare for the final given by their teacher. Being in class for review work is strongly linked to how well your child will do on exams.
- **Exams.** Your child needs to be in school on test dates. Make up dates for state exams and finals are limited.
- **Projects.** Some teachers require end-of-year projects. If your child is not in school, she will not be available to hear about due dates and resources for these projects. Nor will she be able to ask teachers for help if she is stuck.

### SPORTS PHYSICALS

A physical examination is required each year prior to participation in any athletic activity sponsored by the Nebraska School Activities Association. The physical examination is valid for one year from the date of exam and may be performed any time after May 1 prior to the next school year. These physicals are for all students entering grades 8-12 who will participate in sports for the 2012-13 school year. Payment of \$25.00 is required at the time of service. A parent must accompany any student under 19 years of age.

### SEVENTH GRADE PHYSICAL

A physical examination is required upon entry into 7th grade according to Nebraska LB59 law. The physical may be performed up to 6 months prior to the beginning of the school year in which your child is enrolled in 7th grade. The clinic is requesting a parent/guardian to please accompany the student to the exam. If the student plans to participate in sports, the sports physical will be completed at the same time the 7th grade physical is performed. All 7th grade students are required to have three doses of the Hepatitis B vaccine, two doses of MMR vaccine and two Varicella vaccines or a history of having chicken pox. Immunizations are available at the clinic or at a reduced cost at area immunization clinics. Once the physical exam and immunizations are completed, the original physical form(s) should be returned to the school. This can be done any time prior to the first day of school. The cost of this physical is \$50.00. Immunizations are not included in this charge.

### KINDERGARTEN PHYSICAL

A physical exam is required upon entry to kindergarten according to Nebraska LB59 law. This physical may be performed up to six months prior to the beginning of the school year in which your child is enrolled in kindergarten. The following immunizations are required upon entrance to kindergarten: 2 doses of MMR, 3 doses of Hepatitis, at least 3 doses of DPT and IPV, and two doses of Varivax (if your child has not had the chicken pox). Please bring your child's immunization records at the time of the physical so we can make sure their immunizations are current. Immunizations are available at the clinic or at area immunization clinics at a reduced cost. Once the physical exam and immunizations are completed, the original physical form(s) should be returned to the school. This can be done any time prior to the first day of school. The cost of this physical is \$75.00. Immunizations are not included in this charge.

### HEARTLAND PRESCHOOL TAKING APPLICATIONS FOR THE 2012-13 SCHOOL YEAR

Heartland Preschool is now taking applications for the 2012-13 school year. There will again be two sessions, each running four days a week, Monday through Thursday. Mornings will be for 3-year-olds and the afternoons will be for 4 & 5-year-olds. Peers can attend two, three, or four sessions a week. There is a cost for the peers to attend preschool of approximately \$2.50/hour. Tuition can be paid by the month, quarter or semester, and is due prior to the start of each pay period. Reduced or free tuition is also available for those families who qualify. Please let me know if you want to apply for tuition assistance.

In selecting peer models for Heartland Preschool, the program teacher and administrator have to consider the numbers and individual needs of the students for which the program is designed. The peers who are believed to fit best into the sessions are the ones selected. Peers also need to be ones who will provide good language and social modeling for the children who are receiving specialized intervention. The children not selected as peer models can remain on the waiting list and might be added later in the school year or be considered again the following year if they are not kindergarten eligible by then. Every effort will be made to accommodate all parents who want their child in Heartland Preschool or to recommend other preschool programs in the area if necessary.

### SUMMER LIBRARY VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

There is a wonderful opportunity waiting for you to make a difference in the lives of young readers this summer! "Dream Big READ!" is the theme of the Summer Library and Reading Program at the Heartland elementary school library this summer and volunteers are needed to make this reading theme come alive for children. Volunteers may read, tell, or dramatize a story for children during a story hour. Stories need not follow the summer library theme but may be on any book or topic appropriate for children. Especially needed are readers who want to share their own writing or their own life experiences involving stories.



The library will be open at Heartland Community School on Tuesdays and Fridays, from June 12th to July 20th. Story hour will be at 9:30 A.M on Tuesdays. If you would like to get involved in reading to children during the Summer Library Program, please call the school office at 723-4434.

The Opening Session concluded with the campaign speeches of 14 candidates running for 6 state officer positions.

### Encouraging Reading

#### EXPERTS RECOMMEND THAT KIDS KEEP READING OVER THE SUMMER

Research shows that one of the very best ways to reduce summer learning loss is to read. But how can you keep your middle schooler reading over the summer months? You can:

- **Visit the library.** Don't just check out books. Position your child in front of the magazine rack for 15 minutes and let him browse. If you are planning a summer trip, ask him to pick out a few audio books to listen to as you travel. Open up as many avenues for literacy as possible.
- **Think fun.** Boys, especially, tend to enjoy graphic novels. Summer is the perfect time to gobble them up. There may not be as much opportunity for light reading during the school year.
- **Challenge your child.** If your child's teacher hands out a summer reading list, make a deal with your child: If he reads one or two extra books on the list, you will give him a special treat or privilege.
