Welcome Back





There are a number of "hot topics" in the news and it is as though people feel it necessary to "take sides" on these issues rather than work together on a solution. While there are always rumblings of changes on the horizon, education is typically slow to change and for good reason. We work with people. That is our "business". If we were producing 'widgets', decisions to make changes along the way wouldn't be near as difficult. But, we don't and we take that very seriously. We want to make sure that we are doing what is right for our kids, our community, our 400+ people in the building every day, and to help parents in the development of our most precious commodity. Hopefully, we can work together to find solutions.

One of the topics that has received a lot of attention lately is the initial draft of the state health standards. The first draft received a tremendous amount of criticism and the committee has gone back to the table to rewrite their proposal. The new document will be reviewed as was the last and it will either be rewritten again or moved forward. The key to this process is that we are in control as a local district, because these standards are not required. I can confidently say that there is no way our district approves the health standards if they are anything like the first draft. We will continue to teach health as is appropriate for our students and our community. The more controversial topics are best left for the parent to teach, not the school.

Another topic in the news is critical race theory. The theory generalizes that race has been socially constructed over hundreds of years to oppress and exploit people of color and that laws and governmental processes have been tainted toward the wealthy, white groups because of this bias. Its basis is an offshoot of Marxist beliefs that society should have no economic or political classifications and that all work should be for a common good or utopian society. It promotes the uprising of the oppressed to overthrow the systems of capitalism. Countries that have approached many of these beliefs are those that operated under communism or socialism as the basis of their governments.

We talk about the dangers and oppressiveness of socialism and communism in history and government classes and this theory falls in that category. We won't promote ideologies that are contrary to the fabric of our community and in the midwest, I don't believe there is any chance that it becomes required curriculum in our schools.

The other debate that arises frequently is that of COVID and whether or not to wear masks or receive vaccinations or both. This topic has become so politicized that it is virtually impossible to make a decision that pleases everyone. Over the next couple of months, there will be new information released daily and we will spend countless hours sifting through it all. Unless there is a state mandate to the contrary, we are planning to open school in August and continue to operate without masks or protocols specific to the pandemic as we had last year. We are looking for a more "normal" school year and we will do our best to share what we know and, once again, take our community into consideration with decisions in this area.

We hope that you enjoy the last couple of weeks of summer and that you are ready to take on a new and enjoyable year at Heartland. We are all on the same page when it comes to taking care of our/your children and preparing them for their future. If you ever have a question, please email, call, or stop in for a visit over a cup of coffee. Hearing things first hand goes a long way to ease one's anxiety. Let's all focus on working together.

Breakfast/Lunch Prices for 2021-2022

While meals are free for students for the 2021-2022 school year, the USDA requires districts to set prices each year. Lunch prices are set at \$2.80 for students in grades K-6, \$2.95 for students in grades 7-12, \$3.80 for employees, and \$4.00 for guests. Reduced price lunches are set at \$0.40. Breakfast prices are set at \$1.75 for students and \$2.00 for adults. Reduced price breakfasts are set at \$0.30. Milk prices are set at \$0.40, and students must still pay for extra milk. Kindergarten milk is not covered by any programs and must be paid for by the beginning of the school year. Lunch account balances are updated daily, and we ask that all families keep their lunch accounts with a positive balance.

SCHOOL MEALS AT NO CHARGE FOR ALL STUDENTS

Effective for School Year 2021-22, Heartland will serve meals at no charge to enrolled students. The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has approved local school districts to provide no-cost meals to all enrolled students for the duration of the 2021-22 school year.

The new school year requires a new meal application. Although school meals will be provided at no cost to all children, school funding depends on completed meal applications. It is important to submit a complete SY2021-22 meal application as soon as possible. Only one meal application is needed for each household.





ANNUAL NOTICE TO PARENTS: Right to Request Teacher Qualifications

Our district receives federal funds for Title 1 programs. You have the right to request information regarding the professional qualifications of your child's classroom teacher(s). If you request this information, the district or school will provide you with the following as soon as possible:

- If the teacher has met state licensing requirements for the grade level and subject in which the teacher is providing instructions;
- If the teacher is teaching under an emergency status for which state licensing requirements have been waived;
- The type of college degree major the teacher has and the field of discipline for any graduate degree or certificate; and
