As this is my last article prior to retirement, I would like to take the space to offer a heartfelt "thank you" to the patrons of Heartland Community Schools. While I only spent 10 years with you, I could not imagine a better school and community in which to wrap up my career. I appreciate the way that you welcomed Dianna and me and the support that you have shown us along the way. We will continue to follow Heartland and support you in any way that we can.

Some things have changed and others have stayed the same during my long four-decade career. Unfortunately, I have seen a troubling trend, especially over the last couple of years, that is a direct threat to the educational success and opportunities that we have enjoyed for decades. The last couple of years of national uncertainty and illogical and uninformed banter have created a heightened mentality of distrust that is affecting education on a national level. It used to be that teachers, coaches, and board members were held in highest regard and were trusted and supported for pouring their hearts and souls into everyone else's kids. Now, we are losing educators at a record level and the pool of students interested in teaching is drying quickly. This is in direct correlation to the changes in attitudes among those that previously would have been supportive at every turn.

Teaching is an art that is fueled by passion for making a difference in ALL children's lives by doing whatever it takes. When these amazing individuals are challenged and disrespected, they often lose that passion and begin to question their "why". We have to get back to letting our educators know that there is a very high level of unconditional trust for their doing what is best for our children. If the rhetoric doesn't change, in the next few years, schools will not look like they do now.

We need more people to speak up and make sure educators know that we have their backs and that there is unending and genuine trust and support for them. We need people to challenge those that say negative things that distract others from this purpose. We need to step back and re-evaluate our actions to make sure they are helpful and not at any anyone's expense. We need to get back to allowing our kids to squirm a bit, if things don't go their way, without trying to explain it all away by placing blame on the educators. Talking negatively about an educator in front of a child causes harm that is beyond repair in most situations. Our educators won't do anything to purposefully cause harm to our kids. They want what is best for them just like we all do.

At Heartland, we have it much better than other areas of the state or country, but we are not immune. It is starting to whittle away at the fabric that has made us a leader in education. It is not too late for society to do better in this regard. I am afraid that we aren't going to like the results if we don't.

FBLA MEMBERS WILL REPRESENT NEBRASKA AT NATIONALS

Nine Heartland FBLA members will represent Nebraska at the National Leadership Conference in Chicago this summer. The conference will be held June 28 to July 3. The following students will compete: Kale Wetjen in Sports and Entertainment Management, Abigael Stebbing and Riley Goertzen in Marketing, Owen Mierau in Computer Problem Solving, Kaylee Goertzen and Isabelle Johnson in Introduction to Business Procedures, and Austin Schmidt and Lydia Jahnke in Introduction to Business Concepts. HEARTLAND FFA LAND JUDGING TEAM IS 26TH IN NATION!

Recently, the Heartland FFA Land Judging team competed at National Land Judging in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. They earned the right to attend Nationals by receiving 3rd in State back in October. Team members (Alex Goertzen, Mason Hiebner, Tyler Lewis, and Carson Ott) have been studying throughout the spring for this contest. They left on May 3rd, so that they could utilize the days leading up to the contest to study the different soils in Oklahoma. Six practice sites were set up at Arcadia Lake where Oklahoma Soil Scientists were stationed to help teach the contestants about the competition. The National competition has some unique differences between the nation and Nebraska. Contestants had to observe the texture of the topsoil and subsoil. They had to figure out the slope and erosion of the land, as well as the depth of the soil. From there they had to identify the correct soil permeability and water runoff. These items allow the contestants to identify a specific land classification. Knowing the land classification allows landowners to accurately manage their soils, to allow them to conserve their topsoil. One hundred teams, representing 34 states, weathered the storms and rain that come through Oklahoma in the spring. The National competition took place on Thursday, May 5th. The competition was postponed an hour due to a weather delay. That along with storms the night before the contest caused the contest conditions to be extremely wet. Heartland's team took top Nebraska honors by placing 26th in the nation, only 37 points out of the top 10. Overall, there were over 389 contestants. Heartland's team consisted of four seniors: Alex Goertzen - 38th, Tyler Lewis - 98th, Mason Hiebner - 157th, and Carson Ott - 184th.

The Heartland seniors also had the opportunity to do some sightseeing while in Oklahoma. They toured the Oklahoma City Memorial, where they learned of the tragedy that happened in 1995. Members also attended the National Western Heritage museum, where they were able to learn more about the history of the west.
