he Heartland Huskies boys golf team has been hard at work in the month of April. They traveled to Friend and battled through the wind, with the team finishing in 6th with a 410. Jacob Regier led the team with a 98 and placed 12th. Creighton Friesen followed with a 99 and placed 14th. Alex Goertzen finished with a 105, Andrew Franz finished with a 108, and Ryan Hiebner rounded out the team with a 120. The Huskies then traveled to Geneva for the Fillmore Central Invite. The team improved and finished 1st with a 396. Jacob Regier placed 3rd with a 92 and Mason Hiebner placed 4th with a 94. Alex Goertzen and Creighton Friesen both finished the day with a 105 and Reeve Oswald finished with a 108. On April 20th, the Huskies were back at it at David City for the David City Invite. Bond Issue Info

The ideas for these proposals precipitated from a building and facility study completed over the last 9 months. From that study, it was apparent that there were instructional needs for teaching in small groups, security needs, and updates to areas of the building that have not seen renovation in the last 40 years.

Teaching strategies have changed over the last 4 decades and security issues have, unfortunately, come to the forefront of what the district deals with on a daily basis. The instructional space limitations and limited ADA access in the weight room and locker rooms also contribute to potential safety issues as training regiments have changed significantly in that period of time.

For many years, the preschool and daycare options along with a housing shortage have limited growth in our communities and in some cases affected business' ability to hire new staff. The board would like the patrons to decide if they want to make this investment in the future of our school and communities.

Fortunately, we have also seen a trend in the last 10 years of former graduates returning to the area to work and raise their families. The City of Henderson is beginning work on a 30+ lot housing subdivision and Bradshaw has had conversations of expanding housing, both of which will certainly bring more families to the Heartland district.

The school board has passed a resolution calling for a bond

issue vote at the May primary election. The ballot will include two questions. While they are both planned to accommodate and expand services for our families, the two questions are not dependent upon one another. As standalone projects, one may fail while the other may pass.



Question #1

To complete additions and renovations in these areas:

- Front entrance renovation for security • and necessary updates;
- Additional classrooms to provide space for changes in instructional strategies and increasing enrollment;
- New locker rooms and weight room to provide necessary updates, ADA access, improve safety surrounding physical education and activities, and secure community access;
- Connecting the satellite ag and industrial tech shop with the main building to provide for increased security and environmental advantages;
- Add air conditioning and replace the bleachers in the north gymnasium.

Question #2

To complete an addition to::

- House expanded preschool services;
- Serve as a secure facility for before and after school care;
- Provide space designed to house a community operated daycare facility.

\$1.37 Million

Tax Impact for Question #1:

- Every \$100,000 in residential or commercial property translates to an increase of \$59.00 per year or \$4.92 per month.
- For every \$100,000 of agricultural property, one would expect to pay an additional \$29.50 per year or \$2.46 per month. Using a per acre value of \$10,000, the taxes would be approximately \$2.95 per acre per year.

Tax Impact for Question #2:

- Every \$100,000 in residential or commercial property translates to an increase of \$14.00 per year or \$1.17 per month.
- Agricultural land would be valued at 50% for bond purposes, so for every \$100,000 of property, one would expect to pay an additional \$7.00 per year or \$0.58 per month. Using a per acre value of \$10,000, the taxes would be approximately \$0.70 per acre per year.



Heartland's current tax levy is \$0.54. The total levy for both projects would add \$0.073, bringing the total levy \$0.613. Even at this higher rate, we would maintain a levy \$0.12 below our lowest taxing neighboring school.
