3. Develop spending levels and patterns that are sustainable.
4. Place a reasonable tax burden on the patrons of our district.
5. Utilize planned, capital expenditure investments as a mechanism for mitigating unplanned, capital expenditure costs.
6. Maintain adequate financial reserves as a support to maintaining excellent programs, providing high-quality facilities, and ensuring operational stability across a range of varying environments.

We here at Heartland Community Schools would not be able to provide our students with the education or the opportunities that we do without the high expectations or the support provided to the district by our patrons. HERE ARE SOME TIPS ON A COMMON HABIT SEEN IN EARLY CHILDHOOD CLASSROOMS



WHAT IS W-SITTING?

- Both knees and hips are bent
- Knees & ankles are touching the floor
- heels are back towards their bottom

WHY W-SITTING?

- Decreased core (tummy) strength
- Decreased sitting balance (wobbly)

ENCOURAGE THESE INSTEAD



WHY IS W-SITTING "BAD"?

When kiddos hang out here too long/frequently it can:

- Lead to impaired rotation in leg joints
- Overstretch some muscles while making others too tight
- Impact balance strategies for larger gross motor tasks

you can

1. Make sure it doesn't become a habit
2. Increase core strength

Core Exercises: Hold for 5, 10, or 15 seconds!





EARN COLLEGE CREDIT IN *High School*

Students at HCS are getting a head start on college this semester by enrolling in dual credit courses from Southeast Community College!


Some dual credit statistics for 1st semester:

- 19 sophomores, juniors, & seniors are taking at least 1 dual credit course from Southeast Community College for a total of 38 courses
- A total of 112 credit hours are being taken this semester
- 15 of those students are taking a Career Academy course which means that they won't pay any tuition! This is a total of \$4,386 in tuition savings for HCS families!
- 15 courses are taken via the SCC DC Advantage program which offers half price tuition! This is a total of \$1,530 in savings for HCS families!
- Classes being taken include: American Government, Introduction to Psychology, Public Speaking, Personal Finance, Introduction to Sociology, Agriculture Occupation Exploration, Basic Medical Terminology, English Composition, Analytic Geometry and Calculus



Maker Space, PK - 12th Grade

"A place in which people with shared interests, especially in computing or technology, can gather to work on projects while sharing ideas, equipment, and knowledge" After months of planning, a Maker Space for our PK-12th grade students is becoming a reality. Teachers now have the option to bring more technology and problem solving into their classrooms with our hands on Maker Space. Students are also taking advantage of the new tools to fill their time when they are finished with their assigned school work. Kindergarten students have been busy learning left and right with the use of the Bee Bots. 6th grade students have been learning to code to get through mazes with the Dash robot. Many students have



enjoyed getting to create their own designs through the use of the 3Doodler pen. Mrs. Waegli was even caught jamming out to a cardboard guitar. The hope behind the Maker Space is to allow more opportunities for students to experience STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, math) projects and possibly spark some interest into STEM related careers in the future. "STEM occupations have grown 79 percent in the past three decades. In addition, STEM jobs are projected to grow an additional 11 percent from 2020 to 2030. Only 20 percent of high school graduates are prepared for college-level coursework in STEM majors," rural areas are a concern. (U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics & Bridget Long, dean of the Harvard Graduate School of Education). "I hope that by the time students leave Heartland they have at least been exposed to STEM through a fun, hands-on experience where they have learned to problem solve and think outside the box" ~ Mrs. Waegli



BE CAREFUL DURING HARVEST TIME

Over the coming weeks, harvest will begin to pick up steam at various stages in our area. Consequently, our area fields and roads will begin to experience a significant increase in activity. Over the coming weeks, students, parents, school buses, and commuter traffic will all be sharing the roads with large trucks and heavy equipment.

Whether working in the fields or traveling on the roads, harvest is always a time when all of us should pay special attention to safety. This time of year naturally brings fewer hours of daylight and a natural sense of urgency to work and to travel quickly. Additionally, increased dust levels and low sunlight angles can often reduce a driver's visibility during peak travel times.

I encourage all of our area farmers to keep safety in mind and I wish them a safe and productive harvest. I'd also like to encourage all of our students and parents to travel safely and to be mindful of the increased presence of large trucks and heavy machinery on our highways and county roads. I encourage all users of the road to be courteous, to stop at all stop signs, to use extra caution at all intersections, to signal all turns, to use greater following distances, and to reduce speed when traveling in conditions where visibility is reduced.

It only takes a few extra seconds or minutes to exercise a degree of caution and to make safe choices. However, the choices that are made during those brief moments can have a lifetime impact on you and on those around you.
