If closure decisions cannot be made the night before, our goal regarding early-morning decisions will be to communicate with you between 6:00 AM - 6:30 AM.



■ Choosing a Book That is "Just Right"

Often you may notice that your child will select books that seem to be "too easy" for them. When your child reads books that are below their reading level they build confidence, gain fluency, and grow a love for reading. Many adults have a favorite book they have reread many times or maybe you can think back to your elementary years and the books that you read over and over (for me it was Beverly Cleary and the "Ramona" books). Allow your child to reread their favorite books but also encourage them to try some books that are at the appropriate reading level.

So how do you choose a book that is at their level?

Choosing a book that is the correct level for your child is important. Attempting to read a book that is too difficult will frustrate your child so implementing the "5 finger rule" may be beneficial. Ask your child to read the second page of a book. Each time he/she comes to an unknown word, hold up one finger. If all five fingers are up before they finish the page, the book is probably too difficult.

As a teacher, I have found that kids are very receptive to this strategy. They want to have a book they can both read and understand. Our library staff is very helpful in pointing you and your child in the right direction— finding a book that is not only interesting to them but at the correct level as well.

Heartland Huskie Band Received 3rd Place in Class C at Harvest of Harmony

The Heartland Huskie Band traveled to Grand Island for the 81st annual Harvest of Harmony band competition. There were 97 bands competing in the parade division. There are three different judges, one judging music, another marching and a third adjudicator judging music/general effect which covers music, marching and general effect as a total package. The Heartland band received a perfect 30/30 points in marching and in music/general effect received 29/30 which was the highest score given that day. In music the band received a much lower score which was not representative of the music the band produced. In fact, 53 out of the 97 bands received a better score than Heartland or tied the band's score. Even with that score the band finished in a tie for 7th place out of 97 bands.

The band was so happy and honored to see and hear so many Heartland community members supporting the band along the parade route.





HEARTLAND'S MIA HIEBNER SET NEW SCHOOL RECORDS AND TIED FOR 4TH PLACE AT STATE GOLF







ia had a great two days at State Golf. Monday was very warm and calm and Mia hit a solid round of 84 that had her in 8th place after the first day. Tuesday's weather was much different. The temperature was noticeably cooler and the winds were between 20-30 mph. Mia saved her best round of the year for her last one. She carded 14 birdies and 1 birdie for a score of 77. Combined with Monday's score, her two day total was 161. This was good enough to tie her for 4th place. These scores also set two Heartland school records as well. HEARTLAND FFA CHAPTER PARTICIPATES IN DISTRICT LAND JUDGING

he Heartland FFA Chapter traveled to Glenvil, Nebraska to participate in District Land Judging. Upon arrival, students were given the materials needed to participate in the land judging competition. These materials included a clipboard as well as a score sheet, practice/reference sheet, and a capability chart. The score sheet sheet and the practice sheet contain information such as permeability, slope, land classes and much more. As members judge each hole, they fill out the score sheet with answers. The practice sheet allows members to write down notes that they may need that can help them on completing their judging card.

The capability chart allows members to determine the land capability class using the information from students' score sheets. 433 members, making up 24 teams, across the district competed in the competition. Congratulations to the Heartland FFA members for placing 4th as a team! This allows the top four highest scores from Heartland to participate in state land judging. These members include David Hiebner (placed 9th), Jace Friesen (placed 16th), Zach Miller (placed 22nd), and Cash Parrish (placed 32nd)! The State Land Judging competition will be held October 25 in Ord! Good luck state gualifiers!


After land judging, the Heartland FFA Chapter had the opportunity to tour the USDA meat research center, in Clay Center. This research center gave members the opportunity to learn not only about what they do, but why it is important. This research center houses animals to run safe tests and experiments to help better recognize what is going to help improve the local livestock producers. After an introduction, the members traveled around the facility to see where the animals are housed and learned more about some of the technology involved with the experiments.

The Heartland FFA members thanked the USDA for allowing them to tour!






Freshmen took class time to practice learning about surface thickness and depth of soil (2 areas of to help determine land capability class) before competing in the District Land Judging contest.

Recess Reminder: As Colder Weather Approaches




