 Impact balance strategies for larger gross motor tasks



### Tips from Title Reading:

Why Should My Child Read 20 Minutes Each Day?

Reading practice is crucial for all children. Reading with a parent or loved one is a special experience for a child.

Just to be clear, 20 minutes of daily reading may include a child reading, an adult reading to a child, or an adult and child "share" reading. A combination of these techniques can be used based on the age of your child as well as their reading ability.

Imagine these two situations:

-Anne reads 20 minutes per night with her mom, 5 nights a week. During one year, she reads 5,200 minutes.

-Mike reads with his dad only when time allows. They might read 5 minutes at bedtime, 3 days per week. During one year, he reads 780 minutes.

Which student do you think will become a more successful reader?

Please take time to build reading into your child's daily routine. You both will benefit from this time spent together.

The Nebraska State Fair was held August 25-September 4, in Grand Island. FFA members participated in the fair by helping set up the static exhibits, and showing their projects. Thane Wetjen also spent a few hours helping to run the Nebraska Beekeeper's booth where he was able to help educate the public on bees, their hives, honey production, and products. Emma Ott and Cash Parrish showed livestock. Emma won Grand Champion for her Poland China Breeding Gilt. Cash participated in the goat shows, where he received fourth in showmanship and 8, 9, and 7 in various other classes. Static exhibits were shown by 15 Heartland FFA members. Ben Janzen, a senior, received a blue for ears of corn, stalks of corn, and a slab of alfalfa. He also received a purple for a sign that he designed on the school's plasma table and a red on a sheath of alfalfa. Allie Boehr, a senior, received blues for a floral arrangement, sweet bell and banana peppers, cherry tomatoes, and ears of corn. She also received a purple for a yellow corn stalk display. Blake Goertzen, a junior, received blues for his ARC and MIG welding display boards. He received purples for his shelled yellow corn and OA welding display board, and won Reserve Champion for his TIG welding display board. Zach Miller, a junior, received a red for his slab of brome hay. Thane Wetjen, a junior, received Grand Champion and Overall Reserve Champion for his apiculture display of a beekeeping story. 


### We would like to welcome to Lance Ruhl (Maintenance/ Custodial) & Kyra Dick (Para) to our Heartland Staff!

### BE CAREFUL DURING HARVEST TIME

Over the coming weeks, harvest will begin to pick up steam at various stages in our area. Consequently, our area fields and roads will begin to experience a significant increase in activity. Over the coming weeks, students, parents, school buses, and commuter traffic will all be sharing the roads with large trucks and heavy equipment.

Whether working in the fields or traveling on the roads, harvest is always a time when all of us should pay special attention to safety. This time of year naturally brings fewer hours of daylight and a natural sense of urgency to work and to travel quickly. Additionally, increased dust levels and low sunlight angles can often reduce a driver's visibility during peak travel times.

I encourage all of our area farmers to keep safety in mind and I wish them a safe and productive harvest. I'd also like to encourage all of our students and parents to travel safely and to be mindful of the increased presence of large trucks and heavy machinery on our highways and county roads. I encourage all users of the road to be courteous, to stop at all stop signs, to use extra caution at all intersections, to signal all turns, to use greater following distances, and to reduce speed when traveling in conditions where visibility is reduced.

It only takes a few extra seconds or minutes to exercise a degree of caution and to make safe choices. However, the choices that are made during those brief moments can have a lifetime impact on you and on those around you.
