Physical Therapist's TIPS FOR SCHOOL POSTURE AND SAFETY



Make sure your backpack is not too heavy

The weight of a backpack should not exceed 10% of your total body weight. Carry only what you need.







Use both backpack straps

Be sure to always use both straps on the backpack to evenly distribute the weight on the back instead of hanging it all on one shoulder.



Adjust the shoulder straps

Tighten the shoulder straps so that the backpack rests between or below the shoulder blades, not below the low back.




Strategically load the backpack

Place the heaviest items in the back of the backpack so that they are closest to the body.



Use proper technique when lifting your backpack

Hold the backpack close to the body, bend at the knees, and use leg muscles to lift. Keep your back straight and do not bend or twist at the waist.






Use proper posture when sitting in class

Align your head, shoulders, and hips so they are stacked from top to bottom. Keep your feet flat on the floor, with hips, knees, and ankles at 90 degrees

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BE CAREFUL DURING HARVEST TIME

Over the coming weeks, harvest will begin to pick up steam at various stages in our area. Consequently, our area fields and roads will begin to experience a significant increase in activity. Over the coming weeks, students, parents, school buses, and commuter traffic will all be sharing the roads with large trucks and heavy equipment.

Whether working in the fields or traveling on the roads, harvest is always a time when all of us should pay special attention to safety. This time of year naturally brings fewer hours of daylight and a natural sense of urgency to work and to travel quickly. Additionally, increased dust levels and low sunlight angles can often reduce a driver's visibility during peak travel times.

I encourage all of our area farmers to keep safety in mind and I wish them a safe and productive harvest. I'd also like to encourage all of our students and parents to travel safely and to be mindful of the increased presence of large trucks and heavy machinery on our highways and county roads. I encourage all users of the road to be courteous, to stop at all stop signs, to use extra caution at all intersections, to signal all turns, to use greater following distances, and to reduce speed when traveling in conditions where visibility is reduced.

It only takes a few extra seconds or minutes to exercise a degree of caution and to make safe choices. However, the choices that are made during those brief moments can have a lifetime impact on you and on those around you
