REINFORCE THE IMPORTANCE OF ATTENDANCE ALL YEAR LONG

You know that in order to learn, your child must be in school. When your child is absent, he misses instruction. In middle school, several absences in a row can mean quickly falling behind.

But your child's attendance matters to more than just your child. Every child's attendance is important. A school where

the vast majority of students have good attendance is usually a school that performs well.

Here are some ways to promote good attendance for your child and his peers:

- Do not allow your child to miss school except for illness, emergency or religious holidays.
- If you know of any reasons (such as a safety issue) that makes any child fearful of going to school, report them to school authorities.
- Do not condone skipping school for any student. Tell your child that you will report truancy if you see it. You won't let his friends "off the hook."
- Praise good attendance! Grades are not the only important information on your child's report card. Look at the "days absent." Always tell your child you are proud of him when a report card reflects no unexcused absences.

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Ch.I.L.D. DAY PROVIDED BY Heartland Community Schools

The Heartland Community School -Henderson/Bradshaw is setting aside a special time for parents of children age 5

and below to participate in **Ch.I.L.D. Day**, which stands for <u>Childhood Information on Language and Development</u>. Just as parents take their young children to the doctor for medical check-ups, the school can provide to parents the services of a "developmental wellness visit". The early childhood personnel at the school can provide current and useful information to parents concerning the early development of their baby, toddler, or preschooler.

Ch.I.L.D. Day is a childfind effort conducted by Educational Service Unit #6, which provides early intervention services for the Heartland Community School District. School districts are required to conduct childfind activities to ensure that young children who need early intervention services are identified. Involvement in Ch.I.L.D. Day is a free, completely voluntary service and is conducted in a confidential manner.

There will again be evening times available to parents. Ch.I.L.D. Day is set for **Monday, April 11 from 4:00 – 8:00pm** and will be held in the TYKE preschool room in Henderson. Interested parents who live in the Heartland School District can call the school office in Henderson to register for a 45-minute time slot when they can bring their child to the school. Parents will be able to ask questions about their child's development, complete a developmental checklist, and have their child play and interact informally with adults knowledgeable about young children. Further information may need to be gathered at a later time if the parents and school staff see any concerns. Parental permission is required for any further evaluation.

The Heartland Community School wishes to extend this invitation as one way of providing support and information to parents of young children in our district. Again, parents of the Heartland school district are invited to call the school at 723-4434 to register for Ch.I.L.D. Day.

READ! READ! READ!

Reading is a skill, and it gets better with practice. Research shows that kids who spend as little as 30 minutes a day reading books, magazines, and newspapers are more likely to become good readers. Encourage your children to spend some time reading every day.

Read aloud to your children. Research shows that this is probably the most important thing you can do to encourage your children's success as readers. Here are some tips from Jim Trelease's *The Read-Aloud Handbook*:

• Begin to read to children as soon as possible.

• Try to set aside time every day for reading aloud. You can start with just 10 minutes a day.

• Remember that the art of listening is an acquired one. It must be taught and cultivated gradually. Don't confuse quantity with quality. Your child will remember ten minutes of reading together far longer than she'll remember two hours of television.

Here are some tips teachers use to help kids become better readers. All are things you can try during your read-aloud times at home:

• Stop before the end of the story. Ask your child to predict what he thinks may happen next.

• If you're reading a poem, encourage your child to guess what the next rhyming word may be. Ask your child how she might have changed the story.

BE PATIENT AND CREATIVE WHEN COMMUNICATING WITH YOUR CHILD

When he was in elementary school, your child probably couldn't wait to tell you what he learned in math class or who he played with at recess.

But now that he's older? You're lucky to get a mumbled "Fine" when you ask how his day went. And as hard as that can be for parents, it's a normal part of moving toward adulthood.

Of course, that doesn't mean the lines of communication between you and your child must slam shut. It just means you need to be creative about keeping them open. Here's how:

- Keep asking questions. Prepare for curt replies, but don't give up on learning about your child's life. Don't interrogate him, but do let him know you care about him. Try simple questions like, "Who did you eat lunch with?" or "What did you work on during study hall?"
- Stop and listen. Occasionally, your child may surprise you by wanting to share something. Don't miss it because you're busy checking your email. If he comes up and says, "The coolest thing happened today," stop what you're doing and give him your undivided attention.
- Go high-tech. Rather than poke your head into his room every five minutes, send him a text or instant message. He'll be so shocked, that you'll definitely get his attention!

SET REASONABLE EXPECTATIONS FOR YOUR CHILD

It's important to set expectations for your child, but it's equally important to make sure those expectations are reasonable.

To determine whether you're "setting the bar" at the right level, ask yourself if your expectations:

- Are flexible. Have you read parenting books telling you what your child "should be" doing, thinking or feeling at this age? Then you may have lost sight of the fact that most of that information is based on averages. It doesn't relate specifically to what any one individual should be doing (or achieving). Keep that in mind if you find yourself setting a goal for her just because "all the other sixth graders" seem to be meeting it.
- **Reflect who she really is**. Do you see your child clearly when you're imagining what she should achieve? If she has been a reluctant reader since preschool, then pushing her toward honors English may not make sense.
