


Grasping and Prewriting Skills An Occupational Therapy Perspective for Parents

What are grasping skills and why are they. important?

Grasping skills are the fine motor movements of the hand that allow a child to pick up and hold items, eat, play, perform hygiene, build things, handle papers, write with a pencil, and other important tasks.

There are many different ways the hand can grasp. For example, the "3 Jaw Chuck," as seen in the chart below, is useful for holding a pencil for writing. A "**Hook**" grasp gives the ability to hold something with a handle, such as a book bag, or a suitcase. The "Lateral Pinch" allows turning a key in a lock.



Researchers have found that over half of a child's time in the classroom may be spent in activities involving fine motor skills, and most of that involves paper and pencil tasks, which involve good grasping skills. This means that a child who shows good development of

grasping and pre-writing skills will be more likely to do well in school and in other activities of childhood.

If your child is already in school and is having difficulty with handwriting, his or her teacher may recommend that the child work with an occupational therapist. The therapist will observe your child's developmental level and grasping patterns, work with you and your child on appropriate goals, and design a program of activities to help improve your child's performance.





A \$500 Fine & 3 Points Off Your Driver's License

STATE LAW:(1) Upon meeting or overtaking, <u>from the front or rear</u>, any school bus on which the yellow warning signal lights are flashing, the driver of a motor vehicle shall reduce the

speed of such vehicle to not more than twenty-five miles per hour, shall bring such vehicle to a complete stop when the school bus is stopped, the stop signal arm is extended, and the flashing red signal lights turned on, the stop signal arm is extended, and the flashing red signal lights are turned on, and shall remain stopped until the flashing red signal lights are turned off, the stop signal arm is retracted, and the school bus resumes motion. This section shall



not apply to approaching traffic in the opposite direction on a divided highway or to approaching traffic when there is displayed a sign as provided in subsection (8) of this section directing traffic to proceed. Any person violating this subsection shall be **guilty of a Class IV** misdemeanor, shall be fined five hundred dollars, and shall be assessed points on his or her motor vehicle operator's license pursuant to section <u>60-4.182</u>.
