Normally, we would be busy with wrapping up another school year, putting the final touches on graduation, having banquets, and nursing sunburns from track meets and the elementary field day. The conditions surrounding the closure due to the pandemic have felt very strange, to say the least. Teachers have been very busy with keeping in contact with students and encouraging them to participate in enrichment activities, but as they work from home, it just isn't the same around here. The building is largely quiet; only a handful of people continue to work in their offices paying bills, building a budget and ordering supplies for next year, and assembling learning packets for students. Our administrative team is constantly involved in Zoom meetings to learn more about best practices, required reports, talking with teachers, and sifting through new information released from the governor or state department.

The office ladies have been working in shifts to manage the phones and keep the rest of us sane. They truly are the ones that "keep it together" and enable us to accomplish what we are required to do. Our food service staff is turning out over 1,200 lunches and as many breakfasts every week so that we can ease that burden for our patrons and their children. Custodians will be coming back in shifts, as there is grass to mow, rooms to clean, maintenance to complete, and walls to paint. I honestly don't feel very settled, right now. I work in the office every day and am busy, but it doesn't feel right. There are no little people greeting us with their toothless smiles or high school students putting the wraps on another school year.

I have always enjoyed seeing seniors mature over the last semester of their schooling. I think the reality of the situation finally soaks in for them and they realize that in a few months, they will be working full time or off on their own to discover themselves in a whole new setting. It is a noticeable and fun change to watch when you see them here every day. I will really miss that this year. We have another great group of young men and women that will be successful in life and represent us, their parents, and themselves well along whatever path they choose.

Education is a marathon, not a sprint, and I am confident that we will all be just fine when this is over. I understand that you are struggling at times, as we are, but I want you to know that there is no need to put undue pressure on yourselves or your children. Now is the time to take care of one another. We will come out of this in great shape and I am fully confident that we will be "back on track" in short order come fall. I ran across this letter of sorts on social media awhile back and wanted to share it with you, with a few small changes. I tried to attribute it to someone in particular, but can only credit it to "anonymous":

Dear Parents.

Don't stress about schoolwork. In September, we will get your children back on track. We are educators and that is our superpower. What we can't fix is the social-emotional trauma that prevents the brain from learning. So right now, we just need you to share your calm, share your strength, and share your laughter with your children. No kids are ahead. No kids are behind. With love, All of us in education


Please take care of one another, be well, and enjoy this time together. If we are patient and do what we need to do each day to remain healthy, we will bounce back and be better for it.







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Are you interested in becoming a local substitute?

During most times of the year, but especially in the spring, we scramble to find substitute teachers. There is a state permit program that allows for individuals without a teaching degree to substitute up to 45 days at their local school. Please consider obtaining this permit and spending some days with us during the school year!

The Local Substitute Teaching Permit is valid for three (3) years and is limited to forty-five (45) days of teaching in any school year. This type of Permit is valid for teaching only in the Nebraska school system requesting the issuance. This Permit requires a minimum of sixty (60) semester credit hours of college coursework with at least one (1) course in professional Education.

The following documents must be submitted for the Local Substitute Teaching Permit:

- The Application form and non-refundable application fee online at www.education.ne.gov/ tcert OR Print, complete sign and date the Application form from the Supporting Forms Supporting Forms link at www.education.ne.gov/tcert and your payment by check or money order AND
- Record of Residence Form online if you have lived in Nebraska for the immediate past five (5) years, OR complete a Livescan fingerprint card at a State Patrol office OR two (2) ink rolled fingerprint card(s) and fingerprint fee by check or money order. Order the fingerprint packet at AND
- Official Transcripts indicating sixty (60) semester credit hours of college coursework to include a professional education course. A professional education course is any course with an education prefix or a course in child psychology, child growth and development, classroom management, school organization, child abuse and neglect, observation of children or in general terms, anything dealing with children, schools, or education AND
- Written request from the Superintendent for issuance of the Permit. This request must be signed by the Superintendent or the personnel director of the school system. Include a statement indicating that the issuance of the Permit is approved or requested by the local governing board.
- Official transcripts for a pre-approved course to meet the Human Relations Training requirement. NOTE: The Temporary Certificate, valid for SIX MONTHS, will be issued if the Human Relations Training requirement has not been met.
