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Dear Parents, Patrons, and Friends of Heartland Community Schools,

I am sure you are aware of the Federal Stimulus Funds that have been made available to school districts across the country. The state of Nebraska has used a good portion of these funds for state aid to schools. Since we are a non equalized district, we have not received any funds through the state aid formula. What is a non-equalized district? There are approximately 45-50 school districts in the state that are considered land rich districts and Heartland is one of them. This means that our valuations are high in comparison to our number of students and as a result, the state does not send state aid dollars to offset the difference as they would if we had low valuations and a larger number of students.

We are receiving stimulus funds for our Title I program and for I.D.E.A. (special education) funds. The Title I funds help us to totally fund the cost of the program as we have subsidized the program through the general fund for the past number of years. We are using the I.D.E.A. funds to assist the classroom teachers to make their lessons more visual. We are placing laptop computers, projectors, and interactive white boards in each of the classrooms that will assist special needs students as well as other students. We are also purchasing computers and software for the special education classrooms. We are receiving approximately \$25,000 for the Title I program, \$12,500 for last year and \$12,500 for the current school year. The I.D.E.A. funds total approximately \$80,000, divided equally between last year and this year. Hopefully, this gives you an overview of how the district is spending our stimulus funds.

These additional funds will definitely be a plus for providing additional technology opportunities for our staff and students.

With winter approaching, we also want to remind each of you that winter weather is something we take very seriously in relation to student transportation. It is not only the school bus safety that we are concerned about, but also the many student drivers that are on the road each morning. When bad weather occurs, we usually are out checking road conditions by 4:30 to 5:00 a.m. In addition to the school related announcements that are listed elsewhere in this newsletter, we also will use our calling system called School Reach. Please make sure we have your most up-todate phone numbers so that you will be notified by the automatic calling system. In the mornings we will only attempt to call your main contact number, whether it is your land line or cell phone that you have designated. If we should dismiss school after school has begun, we will attempt to call both your designated number as well as

additional cell phone numbers of both parents. You may also call 402-723-4421 to hear a recorded school weather announcement or access the school web page at www.heartlandschools.org for more information. Please call this number rather than calling the regular school number for school closing information. We want to provide you with up-to-date information and hope everyone has a safe and enjoyable winter.

Blood Mobile November 5

On Thursday, November 5, 2009 the National Honor Society of Heartland Community School will sponsor the Nebraska Community Blood Bank. The Blood Bank will run from 11:00 am-5:00 pm in the old gym at the Heartland School. Registration will be different this year as donors will receive a call from the Nebraska Community Blood Bank instead of Heartland NHS members. The public is able to make an appointment through the Blood Bank caller or online at the Blood Bank web site at the bottom of this article. Walk-ins are also welcome. This blood will be available for patients served by Henderson Health Care Services. Donating blood also can provide an opportunity for Heartland NHS students to earn scholarship funds.

Donor Requirements:

- At least 17 years old (no upper age limit)
- Weigh 115 pounds or more
- Be in good health
 - * No flu, colds, cold sores, or antibiotics- 72 hours prior to donating
 - * No risk of HIV or hepatitis
- Bring a government issued photo I.D.

Health Conditions: donors with blood-related types of cancer are unable to donate. Donors with other types of cancer may be able to donate after being cancer free for at least one year with a note from their physician and a review from the Nebraska Community Blood Bank Medical Director. People with skin cancer and basal cell carcinoma can donate. A donor with diabetes can donate if the diabetes is controlled. A donor is eligible after a full recovery from surgery and when he/she has been released from physician's care. If a person is pregnant she is unable to donate.

HEARTLAND FBLA MEMBERS ATTEND FALL LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

The Nebraska Fall Leadership Conference was held Sept. 29 in Kearney at the Ramada Inn. This conference was a one-day workshop for FBLA officers and members. The FBLA state officers shared information on various activities and state goals. This year's theme is "Simply the Best."

The 2009-2010 Nebraska FBLA goals are: Broadcast – increase Business Achievement Award recipients to 150, enhance the Pledge, raise \$10,000 for the Nebraska FBLA Foundation and provide Gold Seal and Sweepstakes Award information; Everyone – encourage communication, support chapter networking, join the Nebraska FBLA Facebook group, complete state officer TV and radio spots, challenge chapters to connect with at least one local business and develop an FBLA project brochure; Service – raise \$17,000 for the March of Dimes, participate in Go Green! AVOID EMPTY PRAISE TO RAISE A RESPONSBLE, CONFIDENT CHILD

We all know that kids need to feel confident about themselves so they can take on challenges. But sometimes, efforts to boost kids' self-esteem can go too far. That's what college professors and bosses are saying these days.

Many bosses say that their young workers don't have the skills to be successful on the job. After a few weeks, they expect to be promoted. When they're asked to do the tasks for which they were hired, they balk.

In college, some students fall apart when professors criticize their work.

There's no question that kids need self-esteem to grow into healthy adults. But self-esteem that matters grows out of doing this well. Empty praise does more harm than good.

In fact, Sam Goldstein, a researcher at the University of Utah, says that too many kids are like bubbles. "They seem happy. But if they face even a little trouble, they burst."

It is important for you to praise your child. But save it for times when you can deliver it sincerely.

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HELP YOUR ELEMENTARY SCHOOLER DEVELOP AN ACHIEVEMENT ATTITUDE

Attitudes are like mental pictures. Basketball players who can picture themselves scoring a basket can usually do just that. Students who have a positive picture of themselves being successful in the classroom are more likely to achieve.

As a parent, you have the ability to help your child create positive pictures and positive thoughts about what she can do. Here are some ways you can help your child create an attitude of achievement:

- Picture success in school. Help your child create a mental picture of success. "I want you to see yourself getting an A on that book report."
- Stress the importance of effort. If your child is struggling, say, "When you studied hard last week, you got your spelling words right. You can do it."
- Give the positive behavior you see a name. "I was so proud when you were kind to the new boy in class today."
