

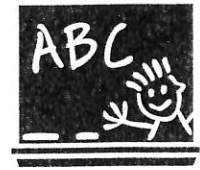

Dear Parents and Friends of Heartland Community Schools,

Preparations for the 2011-2012 school year are well under-way. The first day for students is Wednesday, August 17, 2011. We look forward to welcoming each and every student to the new year at Heartland. There are many changes in staff for the new year. Some of these persons were first introduced to you in the April newsletter, but I want to make sure you are all aware of our new staff members.

Lindsay Bartling will be teaching language arts. Lindsay is from Hooper, Nebraska and is a graduate of Concordia University at Seward. She will also be directing the One Act Play and the all school play.

Greg Vanderneck, who currently lives in Henderson, will be teaching mathematics. Greg is a graduate of UNL and received his teaching certification from Doane College. He has also served as an officer in the U.S. Air Force. He has taught in Grand Island and at Raymond Central. He will also serve as an assistant junior high girls volleyball coach.

Justin Sand will be teaching Industrial Technology. He is a December graduate of UNL and is from Dorchester. Justin will also be coaching junior high football and junior high boy's and girl's basketball.

Gina Mestl, who also currently lives in Henderson, will be the new media specialist. Gina had previously taught Title I at Heartland in 1996-97 and has taught the Bethesda Church pre school for the past 13 years. She is a graduate of Hesston College and Goshen College.

Jon Baehr, Title I instructor, will assume the Athletic Director responsibilities. He also serves as head boys basketball and girls golf coach.

Current plans are to provide German instruction via Distance Learning.

In addition, the T.Y.K.E.S. program will now become the Heartland Preschool and will be operated by the district rather than by E.S.U. 6. This change was made because of rising costs. Dot Quiring, who has taught the preschool since its beginning will continue as the teacher, but will now be employed by the Heartland District. The program will continue to operate very similar as before.

We look forward to having each of them join the Heartland Staff and we are really looking forward to the new school year.

BREAKFAST/LUNCH PRICES

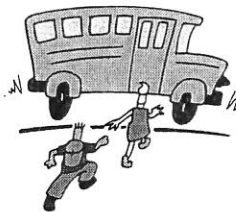


Breakfast and lunch prices have been set for the 2011-2012 school year. Lunch prices for students in grades K-6 are \$2.50 per meal and students in grades 7-12 will pay \$2.60 per meal.

Students who qualify for reduced price meals will pay \$0.40. The Huskie meal for 9-12 students will pay \$2.00 extra. Adult employees will pay \$3.10 per meal and visitors will pay \$3.70 per meal. Breakfast will continue to be served during the 2011-2012 school year for \$1.25. Students who qualify for reduced price meals will pay \$0.20.

Also, kindergarten students will have their afternoon milk included in their lunch accounts. Afternoon milk for kindergarten students is 25 cents per day. This is entered on your child's lunch account every two weeks. *We ask that all families keep their lunch accounts in a positive balance..* We need your cooperation to see that your child always has a positive balance. A call and/or a note will be sent home with your child when the account reaches a balance of \$10.00 or below. Please make every effort to send money when you receive the notice.

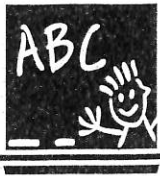

ASBESTOS NOTIFICATION

The Environmental Protection Agency regulation requires that all patrons and employees of the Heartland Community Schools-Henderson/Bradshaw be notified as to the location of asbestos-containing materials in the school building.

Recent inspections conducted by ATC Environmental, Inc. of Omaha confirmed earlier inspections conducted in 1983 that there is pipe insulation containing asbestos particles in several locations in the school. These are located in the old gym, the stage, and several maintenance storage areas. Although the pipe insulation does contain asbestos particles, ATC Environmental Inc. found them to be properly encapsulated and therefore pose no threat to the students or employees of Heartland Community Schools. Management plans, as required by law, have been filed with the State Health Department and should the materials become damaged in any way, the proper action will be taken by school personnel to insure a safe environment for all students and employees. School Superintendent Norm Yoder and Maintenance Director Matt Quiring have received special training, as required by the EPA, to deal with any asbestos related incidents. If any employees have questions or observe any damage to any asbestos covered materials, they should contact the superintendent's office. A detailed diagram of existing asbestos locations in the school building may be obtained from the superintendent's office. A copy of the management plan is available for public inspection in the superintendent's office.

Heartland FBLA Members Win National Awards in Orlando

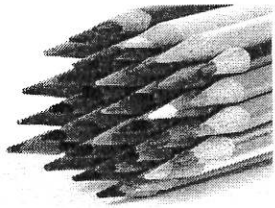

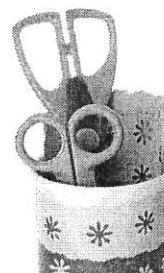

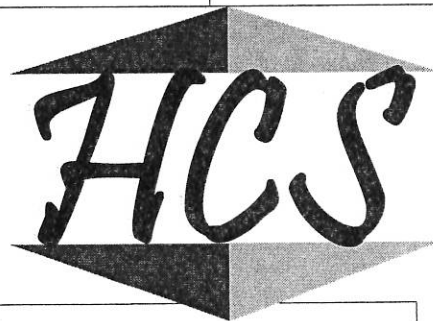
