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Dear Parents, Patrons, and Friends of Heartland Community Schools,

Bullying is something that has been going on for years, yet it is something that no one likes or should have to endure. Unfortunately, even though we make every effort to try and curtail acts of bullying, it continues to take place in our schools, churches, community, and society. We continually talk with staff about monitoring students on the playground, in the classrooms, in the gyms and in the hallways. The following article from the Cut & Paste magazine published by "The Master Teacher" shows several ways parents can talk with your students about bullying and ways to stand up to a bully.

"It's not just "kid stuff"

It's not just "kid stuff" that your child will have to live with. The effects of bullying and teasing can cause depression and anger that can last for years. Schools are well aware of this and are establishing programs and policies to prevent or respond to the problem. But parents need to be involved too.

The behavior is most common in sixth- to eighth-graders. Bullies often target kids who are shy and sensitive, but also pick those who are smarter than they are or different in some way. Or they choose a victim for no reason.

If the abuse is physical, resulting in torn clothes or bruises, and it occurred on school property or at a school activity, parents should contact the school immediately. If the abuse is verbal, parents can help solve the problem and increase children's self-confidence. Teach them to:

Avoid the bully. Take a different route to class or ask for a change in the location of your locker. Ask to sit at the front of the bus or the class.

Stand tall. Just acting brave can be enough to make a bully lose interest. Feel good about yourself. Exercise so you look and feel more fit. Wear clean clothes.

Ignore him or her. Walk away and pretend not to hear the teasing. Bullies want a big reaction to their meanness, so give no reaction at all.

Practice a few responses. When they insult you, say, "That's not cool," or if they say your hair is red or you are fat, say,

"Thanks for pointing that out. I didn't know it before!" Or say "No, stop it!"

Don't show that you're afraid, angry, or upset. That's what they want.

Get involved in a club or an organization that interests you. Find a friend.

Electronic bullying can be especially hurtful because it follows the child home. If insults are anonymous, parents can contact the Internet provider to identify the bully. Often he or she will stop if identified. If the child knows who the bully is and the bullying doesn't stop, change the child's email address. Give the new one out only to trusted friends.

I trust we can all work together to end bullying in our schools and community, not only among students, but with adults as well.

HEARTLAND KINDERGARTEN ROUNDUP SCHEDULED FOR MARCH 8th

Heartland Community Schools will hold Kindergarten Roundup on Thursday, March 8th, in the kindergarten room.

The purpose of Roundup is to provide an opportunity for next year's kindergarten students to meet their teacher, Mrs. Thiesen, and to meet other prospective kindergarteners, while their parents register their children for attendance at Heartland Community Schools. Children who will be five years of age by July 31 of 2012 are eligible for kindergarten in the fall of 2012 and should consider attending Roundup.

Two sessions will be held. The morning session will begin at 9:00 A.M. and the afternoon session will begin at 1:00 P.M. Parents will meet in the conference room with Cindy Huebert, elementary principal. Parents and guardians will have this time to register their children for attendance in kindergarten next year.

Parents should bring their child's immunization records with them as well as an original copy of their child's birth certificate. Birth certificates are available from: Vital Records, P.O. Box 95065, Lincoln, NE 68509-5065 for \$12.00, 402-471-2871. You can download a form or fill out an online request by going to www.hhs.state.ne.us/ vitalrecords/index.htm.

All eligible children residing in the Heartland district whose names are on the current census list will receive an invitation to Roundup by March 8th. If you are planning on optioning your child into the district, all option papers must be turned in by March 15th, 2012, for the 2012-2013 school year. If you know of a child who will be five by July 31 and for any reason may not have his or her name on the school census list, please call the school office so that an invitation can be prepared for them. ENCOURAGEMENT CAN BUILD YOUR MIDDLE SCHOOLER'S SELF-ESTEEM

The middle school years can be a tough time for your child's self-esteem. These years usually bring many physical changes. Many children are not satisfied with the results. Middle school also means more challenging classes. These are also the years where your child may be constantly comparing herself with others. Sometimes she may feel she comes up short.

You can battle these feelings with encouragement. Here's how:

- **Remind your child** that this stage of her life is temporary. The changes of puberty can be awkward. Tell your child you understand what she is going through.
- Give your child the opportunity to take a healthy risk.

This means trying something new. Learning a new skill is an almost surefire way to increase confidence.

• Talk about the good things going in your child's life. Did she finish her homework, get invited to a movie this weekend, teach the dog to shake hands? Help your child come up with one or two things she is grateful for each day.

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OPTION ENROLLMENT

A student may enroll in on-resident school districts when approved through the option enrollment program. Individuals may only option once unless they change residences. Heartland Community Schools is open to accepting more option enrollment students.

If you know of someone who would be interested in option enrolling their children into Heartland, please have them call the superintendent's office at (402) 723-4434. High school students must have an option enrollment application filed and approved before March 15, 2012 in order to be immediately eligible for extracurricular activities in the fall.



2012 DRIVER'S EDUCATION

Driver Education instruction will again be offered to Heartland students through the Nebraska Safety Council. The instruction will take place at Heartland Community Schools in Henderson. The fee for

the instruction will be \$280.00 per student for the summer of 2012. You can go online and download a registration form at www.nesafetycouncil.org. Please send completed form and registration fee to PO Box 30578, Lincoln, NE 68503-0578. Checks should be made out to the Nebraska Safety Council. Students can also pick up a registration form from the school office. The fee must be paid the first day of class.

- Advanced registration and payment are required.
- Students must possess a school learner's permit, a school permit or a learner's permit to enroll.

Only one session will be offered this summer and will run July 5-July 10. The behind-the-wheel instruction will be arranged during the classroom sessions. If you have any questions, please contact the school office.





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ARE YOU TEACHING YOUR CHILD TO BE KIND TO OTHERS?

Being a "mean girl" or a bully is never the way to succeed in school - or in life. Answer yes or no to the questions below to see if you are promoting kindness in your child:

1. Do you model kindness by treating your child and all others with kindness and respect?

2. Do you tell your child that the Golden Rule (treating others as you would like to be treated) is a very important value in your family.

3. Do you promote empathy in your child? "Remember how you felt when you didn't get invited to Kaitlyn's party?"

4. Do you praise your child whenever you see her being kind to somebody else?

5. Do you encourage your child to be friend a wide variety of students?

How well are you doing?

The more yes answers you have means that you are demonstrating kindness to your child. For no answers, try those ideas from the quiz.

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TOO MUCH STRESS CAN DECREASE YOUR CHILD"S ABILITY TO LEARN

Middle school students often have a lot on their plates - and on their minds. They can easily become overwhelmed, and the results aren't good. As anxiety goes up, grades go down. If your child seems stressed, suggest ways he can relax. He could:

- Enjoy time with a friend. Suggest they do something that makes them laugh, such as watching a favorite funny movie.
- **Participate in a hobby** (other than playing video games). Hobbyists people who paint, read, collect, do puzzles, you name it usually "lose themselves" in what they are doing for a while. Focusing on these pleasant thoughts helps to defeat stress.
- **Breathe deeply.** Research shows this truly works. A few minutes of slow deep breathing can calm your child when he is feeling overwhelmed. Practicing it for a brief time each day can lower your child's overall stress levels.

• Stretch. Doing yoga is linked to lower stress levels. Tell your child to try a few minutes of relaxing music and slow, gentle stretches.
